A BILL

To require a review of the United States diplomatic posture, and for other purposes.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "U.S. Diplomatic Pos-

5 ture Review Act of 2025".

6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

7 Congress finds the following:

- 8 (1) The allocation of personnel and resources of
- 9 the Department of State in areas of strategic con-

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cern should reflect United States national security
 and foreign policy priorities.

3 (2) The Department of State Strategic Staffing
4 Initiative of 2020 demonstrated a recognition of a
5 need for a continuous, high-level examination of the
6 Department's diplomatic posture.

7 (3) The Department of State should strengthen
8 its capacity to advance United States national secu9 rity and foreign policy objectives through adjusting
10 its diplomatic posture and strategic goals to reflect
11 United States national security and foreign policy
12 priorities and clearly and consistently commu13 nicating such adjustments to Congress.

14 SEC. 3. UNITED STATES DIPLOMATIC POSTURE REVIEW.

15 (a) REVIEW REQUIRED.—

16 (1) INITIAL REPORT.—Not later than 180 days 17 after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Sec-18 retary of State, acting through the Coordinator ap-19 pointed pursuant to subsection (c) and in coordina-20 tion with the heads of other relevant Federal depart-21 ments and agencies, shall submit to the appropriate 22 congressional committees a report that includes a 23 classified, comprehensive diplomatic posture review 24 ("USDPR Report"), and which shall contain an un-25 classified summary.

1	(2) Subsequent reports.—Not later than 1
2	year after the submission to Congress of the initial
3	report required by paragraph (1), and annually
4	thereafter, the Secretary of State shall submit to the
5	appropriate congressional committees an updated
6	USDPR Report in the same form as the initial re-
7	port.
8	(b) CONTENT.—Each USDPR report required under
9	subsection (a) shall, at a minimum, include a comprehen-
10	sive description and discussion of the following matters:
11	(1) A list of all diplomatic and consular posts
12	and domestic offices operated by the Department of
13	State, whether inside the United States or overseas,
14	including—
15	(A) domestic field offices;
16	(B) permanent bilateral missions and
17	branch offices;
18	(C) special bilateral or multilateral mis-
19	sions;
20	(D) multilateral missions accredited to
21	international organizations;
22	(E) legations;
23	(F) United States interest sections;
24	(G) United States liaison offices;
25	(H) consulates general;

1	(I) consulates;
2	(J) consular agencies;
3	(K) American presence posts;
4	(L) remote missions; and
5	(M) virtual presence posts.
6	(2) A review of the degree to which United
7	States diplomatic and consular posts serve the needs
8	of American citizens overseas well, including for con-
9	sular services, travel advisories, and emergency as-
10	sistance.
11	(3) A description of any additional resources
12	needed to sufficiently serve such overseas needs.
13	(4) An analysis of how existing, statutorily-
14	mandated, strategic priorities of the Department af-
15	fect, inform, or alter the Department's approach to-
16	ward implementing goals and objectives.
17	(5) A list of the amounts and kind of foreign
18	assistance provided to other countries and public
19	international organizations, disaggregated by coun-
20	try and by specific account within budget function
21	150 (international affairs).
22	(6) A list of any international financial obliga-
23	tions for which the Department is in arrears, and
24	how the Department will meet these obligations
25	within the next fiscal year.

(7) A description of the costs incurred during
 the preceding year in connection with operating,
 maintaining, and supporting Department of State
 missions, broken out by country and post.

5 (8) A description of major changes the Sec-6 retary of State has made or intends to make in the 7 forthcoming year focused on significant alterations, 8 additions, or reductions, to the allocation of per-9 sonnel and resources across the world to ensure that 10 the Department is optimally positioned to execute 11 statutorily-mandated strategic plans and priorities.

(9) Identification of needed military, economic,
informational, and additional resources outside the
Department of State that are critical to the successful implementation of the strategic priorities described pursuant to paragraph (2).

17 (c) COORDINATOR FOR THE UNITED STATES DIPLO-18 MATIC POSTURE REVIEW.—

(1) APPOINTMENT OF COORDINATOR.—The
Secretary shall appoint from among the officers and
employees of the Department of State a Coordinator
to develop and submit the USDPR Report. The Coordinator shall report directly to the Secretary and
may, at the discretion of the Secretary, retain the

position and responsibilities held by such individual
 prior to such appointment.

3 (2) QUALIFICATIONS.—The Coordinator shall
4 be a person who has significant depth of experience
5 and expertise in international relations, data-driven
6 management, and the policymaking, programmatic,
7 and personnel aspects of the Department.

8 (3) STAFF.—The Secretary shall assign suffi-9 cient personnel from the Secretary's Policy Planning 10 staff or other operating units of the Department of 11 State as the Secretary deems appropriate to support 12 the Coordinator in carrying out the duties required 13 by this section.

(d) BRIEFING.—Not later than 30 days after the submission of each report required by subsection (a), the Secretary of State shall provide an annual classified briefing
to the appropriate congressional committees on—

18 (1) the posture review;

(2) actionable steps the Department of State
has taken or intends to take to make adjustments to
the United States diplomatic posture and strategic
approach; and

(3) additional statutory resources required from
Congress to help meet the United States national security strategy priorities.

(e) APPROPRIATE CONGRESSIONAL COMMITTEES DE FINED.—In this section, the term "appropriate congres sional committees" means—

4 (1) the Committee on Appropriations and the
5 Committee on Foreign Affairs of the House of Rep6 resentatives; and

7 (2) the Committee on Foreign Relations of the8 Senate.
